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Ken Bost honored for cutting-edge research, receives First Citizens Bank Scholars Medal

For his cutting-edge research in such disciplines as human immune-system response and the use of soybeans to deliver vaccines, UNC Charlotte biology professor Ken Bost was named the 2007 recipient of the First Citizens Bank Scholars Medal.

First Citizens Bank and The University of North Carolina at Charlotte recognized Bost's vast accomplishments at a ceremony Monday evening.

It is the 20th anniversary of the award, which was created in 1987 as UNC Charlotte's top honor for faculty scholarship and intellectual inquiry.

"First Citizens Bank is proud to join with UNC Charlotte in presenting this award, which has recognized the important contributions of the University and its faculty members for two decades," said Marc Horgan, Mecklenburg area executive for First Citizens Bank. "Dr. Bost and his impressive body of work continue the longstanding tradition of excellence exemplified by Scholars Medal recipients throughout the years."

Bost, who holds the Irwin Belk Endowed Chair in Biology, has been awarded continuous funding from the National Institutes of Health for his research. He is currently engaged in three projects with total funding in excess of \$2 million.

While at UNC Charlotte, Bost has been very active in research in human immune-system response and the use of soybeans to deliver vaccines. He developed his ideas into the start-up company

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SoyMeds Inc., which has the potential in the future to provide easily, produced, administered and transported vaccines around the world.

“I have known Dr. Bost since he arrived at UNC Charlotte in 1998, and I can attest to the significance of his research accomplishments and productivity during his time here at the university,” UNC Charlotte biology department chairman Michael Hudson wrote in his letter of nomination.

Hudson said Bost has focused his research on profound and complex problems facing humankind.

“Countless humans suffer and die each day from bacterial and viral infections. The spread of antibiotic resistance is arguably the most critical crisis facing us now,” Hudson wrote. “Understanding how infectious agents cause disease is the only hope we have to survive.

“The implications of the studies conducted in Dr. Bost’s laboratory at UNC Charlotte cannot be over-emphasized. All of us at UNC Charlotte should be proud we can call Dr. Ken Bost one of our own. Humans desperately need him.”

Bost has made numerous notable contributions to the field of biology, and his research on immunology has gained widespread recognition for the advancements he has made in the field.

He has also been published in numerous reputable journals and he has received several highly competitive honors for his work, including three previous nominations for the First Citizens Bank Scholars Medal. Bost is frequently invited to speak about a variety of high-profile topics in biology and immunology.

During Bost’s tenure at UNC Charlotte, all five doctoral students from his laboratory have obtained prestigious postdoctoral fellowships.

Seven proposals awarded funding through Chancellor’s Diversity Challenge Fund

Next round of proposals due by March 15

As previously covered in Campus News, UNC Charlotte Chancellor Philip L. Dubois has created the Chancellor’s Diversity Challenge Fund. This fund, which is designed to support faculty, staff and student initiatives promoting the daily value of diversity in the intellectual life of the campus, has awarded funding to seven different proposals. The deadline for projects planned for implementation after July 1 is March 15.

Proposals awarded from the first round of applications are as follows:

- “Diversity in the Workplace,” submitted by Shirley Greene Jackson, Human Resources, \$1,200. Description: Consultant presented “Diversity in the Workplace” session at leadership conference for supervisors and managers on March 6.
- “A Family Affair Multicultural Student Reception” submitted by Regena Y. Brown, Admissions, \$5,000. Description: Reception was held on March 10 to introduce



newly admitted minority students and their families to the UNC Charlotte campus community. The students were exposed to multicultural student organizations, student support services, and alumni of the university.

- “Hispanic Cultural Competence Classroom-Based Workshop,” submitted by Donna Kazemi and Lisa Wagnes, School of Nursing, \$5,000. Description: Development of a Cultural Diversity Workshop series to increase the knowledge of nursing students and faculty about Hispanic culture and the Spanish language. This knowledge will be integrated into future nursing services for the growing Hispanic population.

- “Gifts from my Ancestors,” submitted by Robert Smith, Africana Studies, \$1,480. Description: Calvin Earl provided a concert and lecture emphasizing the significance of African American Spirituals and his efforts to have Congress honor the spirituals as a national treasure on March 12.

- “Community & Communities across the African Diaspora,” submitted by Robert Smith, Africana Studies and Gregory Mixon, History Department, \$1,625. Description: 5th Annual UNC Charlotte Symposium on the African Diaspora is a two-day seminar to expose the campus community to pertinent issues impacting the African Diaspora. The symposium will include UNC Charlotte scholars discussing research topics that traverse the idea of community across the African Diaspora.

- “Architecture as Activism-Diversity Through Design,” submitted by Linda Samuels, College of Architecture, \$4,950. Description: Collaboration among art and architecture students and faculty, and the staff and neighbors of Urban Ministry’s Community Works 945 art, soccer, and community garden program for the homeless of Charlotte.

- “The African/American Connection,” submitted by Tanure Ojaide, Africana Studies and Rosemary Traore, College of Education, \$4,200. Description: Film, discussion and speakers to educate students and faculty about Africa and the connection between Africa and America.



Oregon University scholar to discuss philosophy of emergencies, "inclusive feminism" March 19

Guest speaker Naomi Zack, Ph.D., professor of philosophy and graduate studies director at the University of Oregon, will deliver two public lectures on campus March 19. Her first lecture, titled, "Disaster Preparation and Emergency Response: Notes on Philosophy, Pedagogy, and Safe Campuses," is set for 10 a.m. in Cone University Center, Room 112. At 4 p.m. in Cone University Center, Room 113, Zack will discuss "What Women Have in Common: Inclusive Feminism and Rule by Women."

Describing the topic of the 10 a.m. lecture, Zack said, "[Hurricane] Katrina victims were outraged at 'government' in ways that point to the obligations of government to make life better for citizens. Social contract theory justifies the very existence of government, based on a human condition without government called 'the state of nature.' Contemporary disasters may result in a 'second state of nature' that places a new obligation for disaster preparation and response on government. An important part of this new obligation is based on this moral question: Who we should think about saving, beforehand?"

"Positive feminist political theory requires distinctions about female gender," Zack continued, describing the topic of her 4 p.m. lecture. "For the sake of political change and as a foundation for commonality, women can be relationally defined as those human beings who have been assigned to, or identify with, the group composed of biological mothers, men's heterosexual choices and human females. It is not necessary that a woman be any one of these things but only

that she be related to this historical group in a two-sex system. Such recognized common relation may be able to ground women's cooperative political efforts across their differences in race, ableness, sexual preference, age, income, and other diversities."

Zack's most recent book, "Inclusive Feminism," aims to resolve the contentions among feminism with a new relational definition of women. This is the theoretical basis for a political future in which women can participate in government leadership.
